

Fatberg lays in Hardwick sewers

Some residents have frequently been affected by other residents flushing the wrong "stuff" down our sewers!

Some of our residents are pouring cooking oils and hot fats, also flush acrylic wipes etc down the waste pipes and toilets of our sewers. The wrong "stuff" in the drains deposit downstream somewhere, and NEVER reach the waste water treatment plant (on the edge of Cambridge, opposite Tescos store in Milton). FOUR fatbergs in less than TWO years have deposited in the main sewer of Hall Drive, causing flooding in the toilets of a few homes...this is not very pleasant.

Anglian Water who are responsible for our sewers are fantastic coming out often at unsociable hours to remove the unpleasant blockages, and have great advice on their web site.

"Our sewers and drains are designed to carry the three Ps – Pee, Poo and Paper (toilet)."



A tribute to Jane Giddings 1955 – 2021

Jane's sudden death on June 22nd came as a shock to us all, not least to Ian, her husband, Kathryn and Paul, her children and their families. It really brings it home to me that you live and enjoy each day as if it is your last, as Jane was diagnosed with cancer 11 days before she passed away. This was so unfair, a life taken away far too soon as she had so much to give and live for, with her family including her eight grandchildren, who she adored. Jane had a kidney transplant in 2008 and was diabetic so during lockdown she was shielding and was looking forward to getting back to some sort of normality, but it was not to be.

Jane was a very caring, kind person, thinking about others before herself. She was very family orientated and adored seeing her children and grandchildren. Latterly, she cared for her father who lived in Swindon, her home town and she travelled there a lot to care for him until his death, 7 months ago. I listened with interest to the eulogy in Jane's funeral, so ably read by her son, Paul, dressed in his police uniform. You always learn so much about people on these occasions. As a child Jane loved dance and attended dance school taking part in performances. She was a St John Ambulance Cadet and involved in the Scouting movement which she continued after moving to Hardwick. Jane moved to Limes Road in 1983, when she was already married with two children. This remained their family home with lots of memories which will be treasured for years to come. She joined the WI, the local Scout group and had several jobs in the village over the years including the school, the Little Chef and the village shop. In later years, Jane took up netball and bowls, being a member of Coton Bowls Club. On leaving Scouts, having served in various roles, including group scout leader, she was awarded the Scouting Good Service Medal on her retirement.

I knew Jane through Hardwick WI which she joined in 1988. I was very touched when the WI 'song' Jerusalem was played at her funeral, sung by Katherine Jenkins. Looking back at WI photos, it was obvious that Jane loved WI – eating out, dressing up and generally having fun. She was on the committee for years and was our President from 2012 - 2015 and she achieved such a lot during those three years. Jane was a very keen darts player, a hobby which started in WI and she became the captain of Hardwick WI team. Lynn, one of her darts team said "She was fab at getting the bull but every time, astonished as we always were, we had such fun". During lockdown we started up 'Cuppa, cake & chat' when we could meet in groups of 6 in the garden. Jane was always keen to be part of this and during the last one, on May 18^{th} ,

when the rule of 6 was lifted, she joined us in my garden. Several of us were chatting about receiving our state pension and getting our free bus passes – you never know how the conversation develops and the range of topics we chat about! Sadly, Jane did not reach that age - she would have been 66 on July 3rd. Little did we know then that within a month, Jane would no longer be with us.

To get an overview of Jane's interests, hobbies and involvement in the village, apart from WI, I asked other people for some comments ...

Alan West (Headteacher at Hardwick Primary School from 1986 – 2004) writes...

Jane worked with me at the school as senior lunchtime supervisor for many years and all my memories of herare good ones. Always reliable, always well organised and always consistent. Without Jane, my job would have been so much more complicated. The organising of staff, deployment around the school and playground cover every day was a much more difficult task than she made it look. There are few people in my life I can look back on and say they were as successful as Jane in taking on a complex job and doing it so well for so long. I owe her a huge thank you on behalf of all the children over all those years that benefitted from her calm organisation. A lovely lady who set herself high standards and never faltered in her efforts to achieve them.

Vernon Spencer (President of Coton Bowls Club) writes ...

Jane was a recent member of the Coton Bowls Club and as Paul mentioned in his eulogy at her funeral, she had many varied interests and always joined in with enthusiasm and commitment and bowling was no exception. I have personally known Jane for many years and prior to bowls, spent many times with her at scout summer camps and scouting events. She was always friendly and kind.

Jane joined Coton Bowls Club in 2019 after encouragement from Ian, who has been a member since 2012. Having never played bowls before, she soon got involved and became an enthusiastic participant, always willing to contribute to the team and always willing to learn. However, Ian may have regretted the encouragement, as he later had to put his hand deep into his pocket when Jane needed bowls, kit and all the ancillary equipment. It was great to see them both involved and enjoying their time together at our club and playing against local teams.





Jane had been a Cub Scout leader before coming to Hardwick and stepped smoothly into the role as Akela here in the village. Many boys went through the Cub pack while she was the leader, knowing her as Akela in the hut but Mrs Giddings in the playground.

When the Scout Group needed a new Group Scout Leader to help oversee the smooth running of all the sections in the group, Jane took on this role. She organised the Scout Group committee and recruited new leaders to the team; many parents will remember working with Jane in that position. She maintained her direct contact with young people by still helping out at Cubs and Scouts occasionally and both Jane and Ian would often come on camps as base camp support and would volunteer at other Scouting events.

As part of her Group Scout Leader role, Jane helped underpin the wider Scout Crafts Hill District and was part of the team that set up the Venture Scout Unit in Hardwick.

After stepping down as Group Scout Leader in 2007, Jane continued to support the Scout Group by serving on the Scout and Guide Hut Committee.

Jane was taken away from us far too soon. She will be greatly missed by all those who knew her.

TEJINDER SINGH BHACHU

The village has been shocked to learn of the sudden death of Hardwick Stores owner Tejinder Singh Bhachu on July 15th. Tejinder, known affectionately to most of us as TJ, moved to the village in 1990 when his parents John and Maya bought the shop.

Over the last three decades, he established himself as a central and well-liked figure in the local community as both the shop owner and as a parish councillor. TJ was a friendly and warm



man and always made shop and post office customers feel welcome.

He shared many great qualities with his late father John. He too had a great sense of humour and an admirable dedication to his family.

Many former paper boys and girls can credit TJ as the man who gave them their first paid job. The same can be said of people who worked in the shop and it was greatly to his credit that he was able to kickstart the working life of so many young people.

Shop staff, both past and present, will remember that working with TJ was great fun. Every customer was greeted with a smile. Whether you were an employee or a customer, you could always have a laugh and a friendly conversation with him.

One of TJ's big loves was football. He supported Liverpool and went to his beloved Anfield on many occasions.

TJ was also a very brave man. He and his family showed incredible strength to keep the shop open and running during the coronavirus pandemic. He and Emma were very grateful to the staff who worked extra shifts to help them when John died at the start of the year.



Wildlife Trust BCN Update: West Cambridgeshire Hundreds Aug 2021

This year the Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs and Northants are trialling more events across our West Cambs Hundreds reserves. The events we run need to be suitable for the site, so we use Cambourne for accessible and more flexible sessions as it has a car park, more robust habitats and a choice of flat, wide, surfaced paths. We are planning low-key sessions at our more sensitive sites like Gamlingay, and Waresley and Gransden Woods, running family sessions, wildlife strolls, and bat walks. Find a list of events, and book online, on our website www.wildlifebcn.org/events. Hardwick Wood has a committed team of Wildlife Trust BCN volunteers, who look



after much of the practical habitat management and maintenance of the site, as well as some of the survey and monitoring of wildlife, under the guidance of the trust's Reserves Team. Over winter, this often involves coppicing, but they meet occasionally in the summer to help keep paths clear and catch up on other jobs. They love to see new people, and you are welcome to attend a one-off session or become a regular volunteer, the next meeting is Sunday 22 August where they will be joined by the Cambridge Conservation Volunteers, and will be cutting back vegetation and moving some fence panels. For details of volunteer work parties, how to make contact etc, visit www.wildlifebcn.org/get-involved/volunteer

On many of Trust reserves, additional paths have opened up after the wet winter and high footfall over the past 18 months: in Hardwick Wood, volunteers block these unofficial routes with branches. You can help this nationally important ancient woodland by checking the maps onsite or on our website to ensure you stick to the official paths, this reduces disturbance to wildlife, trampling of sensitive plants, and compaction of the soil, which can affect plant growth.


Hardwick Wood and other woodland reserves nearby, are home to the beautiful purple hairstreak butterfly. You can see this in summer and sometimes into early autumn. It is rare to see it close-to but if you look to the top branches of oaks on a warm evening, you might be able to see them flitting around the canopy. They feed on honeydew which is the sticky liquid produced by aphids feeding on the leaves.

We love to hear about the wildlife you see on our reserves. I'm Rebecca Neal and work with communities surrounding our West Cambs 100s reserves, delivering events and working with all ages.

Transitions and moving on

This summer many of us working through the uncertain transition that may well take us back into the workplace, or to holding large family gatherings, or to attending sporting and cultural events. In this universal time of transitions, I will be working on my own transition. After 11 years as Hardwick's vicar, I will be stepping down in September in order to take up a new post as the Warden of Launde Abbey.

Launde Abbey is a retreat of national spiritual and historical importance, settled in a fold of the Leicestershire countryside near Rutland Water. The Elizabethan manor house built around an Augustinian priory chapel which dates back to 1119. The land and original priory, acquired by Thomas Cromwell and lived in by his son, features in Hilary Mantel's *The Mirror and the Light*. My brief is to bring it out of the pandemic, to deepen its vision and ensure its future as a place of prayer, hospitality and pilgrimage for anyone, and to develop it as a centre for extended Christian community resourcing many.

However, leaving Hardwick will not be easy. I have lived locally with my family for 11 years, for the last 4 ½ years as the Team Rector (team leader for our group of village churches), and as the vicar for Hardwick throughout. During my time here, I have participated in the richness of life with many fellow pilgrims and friends. And I have had the privilege of walking alongside many of you in joys and sorrows, of getting to know you at Pippins and at Summer Afternoons café, and of celebrating Christmas and other seasonal moments together year by year.

The last service I will lead in Hardwick is on Sunday 19th September at 9.30am. But although I will leave in September, the church community here remains the same, with its ministers, churchwardens and other kinds of volunteers, all of whom are very able and are well known to you as part of the village. Extra help will be given where needed by our connected sister parishes in the Lordsbridge Team while we wait for a new vicar to be appointed. The St Mary's team will let you know more about that when they can.

In the meantime, my prayers are with for all of those facing change or travelling through a transition.

THE DAY I MADE A STAND

Like every other England fan on the night of the Euro 2020 final, my head was in my hands and I was devastated about losing on penalties. Something the friend I was watching the game with will testify.

On the way home, I gathered my thoughts and felt things needed to be put into perspective and one of the many things I said was that we should leave Bukayo Saka alone. The reason I picked out 19-year-old Saka especially is because his penalty was the deciding one and was probably the player carrying the biggest weight on his shoulders.

I put my thoughts into a Facebook post which I uploaded that night and also pointed out how finishing 2nd out of 24 teams is no failure and how the so-called 'golden generation' of the 2000's used to scrape past minnows.

The following morning I was reading sickening racist abuse on-line aimed at Like Saka, Rashford and Sancho. They missed in the shootout, but are still on to have very good careers.

I then had another thought. If I was a 19-year-old who'd missed in a shootout (regardless of my skin colour), how would I feel? Would I have been abused? Yes, more than likely. Would I hope and pray someone would reach out and tell me I'm not a failure? Yes, that too.

For the first time in my life, I decided to post an open letter on social media in support of Saka. I posted it on my Facebook page and on Twitter in the hope it might reach him. For those of you that haven't read it, I told Bukayo:

It wasn't his fault that England lost.

He is a role model to aspiring players.

He should be proud of his performances and has had an excellent tournament.

He will achieve more than the social media trolls ever will.

I felt so angry by the abuse I'd seen and I just felt I couldn't stay in the shadows and decided to make a stand. I wanted Bukayo to know that I was there for him. And it's great to know that he's received so many more supportive letters from fans, especially young ones.

It was also very heartening to receive a response from the Football Association who I passed the letter onto. Their media team wrote back and said they'd pass it on. This wasn't a vanity project or something I did for my ego.

I just want people to know about the power of words and how we can use social media for good. Hopefully, the support our players have had will give them the strength they need to rebuild and come back stronger.


<u>Christmas Tree Festival 2021</u> <u>December 10th - 12th</u>







How can we sing the songs of the LORD while in a foreign land? Psalm 137.4

The last 18 months have been like being in a foreign land: a place where the culture is

unfamiliar to us and we are unsure what is expected of us. We have experienced separation and loss, and there has been more anxiety and even fear as we have faced the ever-changing unknown.

As a church, we have met in person only twice since March 2020, with very reduced numbers because of Covid restrictions. Zoom has been a good alternative for us, as it has allowed us to 'meet' with no restrictions - to sing and pray together, and to chat together in breakout rooms after the service. But it has still been like a foreign land and has sometimes been hard to rejoice, or to feel we are supporting each other meaningfully in a difficult time.

As restrictions ease and we are allowed to mix freely again, we enter another foreign land, mindful that others may be more or less cautious than we are about our new freedoms. At church, we have reflected on the fact that we have not been alone during the pandemic, but that God has been with us and our faith has deepened. As we navigate our way in this new land, and reflect on all we have experienced, we can draw near to God and take time to rest in the peace of God's promise:

'Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you.' Hebrews 13.5
